My dear Friends,

Christmas is a fading memory. Now we are ready to make New Year Resolutions. Each year we make our resolutions - each year we break them. Remember, though, the Christ-child does not forget us, nor does he break his promises. "Christ" means the "annointed one" - and that means he still reigns regardless of whether or not we remember him. That message should give Christians hope even in the blackest of moments. Those without faith are sometimes thrown into blackest despair for they have no hope.

Some people come upon their faith suddenly - it comes as a flash of inspiration, of insight sometimes called a "conversion experience." For others faith is something worked out or worked on. For them faith is chipped out of the granite of life's experiences. It develops and takes shape and form only after disappointment, hope, despair, inspiration, tedium, disbelief, insight and hard work have taken their toll.

Whatever your level of faith, whatever your experience I firmly believe that your faith can be enhanced and helped by fellowship, by caring and sharing and by study. It is very difficult to be a lone Christian; it is even more difficult to grow in faith without the help, support and encouragement of fellow Christians.

More and more I see the need for developing two aspects of work here in Purley. First, I see a great need for a greater teaching ministry. By teaching I mean a greater emphasis on the study of our faith through the study of the Bible. But it must be a study involving great commitment in time and effort. It is a fact that when a group of people study the Bible together in depth their own faith is deepened and they grow in confidence. Secondly I believe that we must develop the "caring activity of the Church within the parish.

The parish is growing in number every day. The greater the number of people in the parish the more I come across people, young and old, who are lonely and distressed. Often there are no close relatives ready to help a family in distress. It is at such moments that a caring church can offer to help.

Maybe 1979 will be for us a studying and caring year! I pray that it will.

Every good wish to you all and every blessing for 1979.

WHAT'S NEW ABOUT OLD PURLEY?

Have you wondered what's new about New Hill or why Purley Church is so far from the manor house at Purley Park giving the old Squire quite a drive on Sundays unless he used his private footpath via the tunnel under the railway?

The answers lie in the arrival of the Great Western Railway whose construction nearly 140 years ago brought changes even greater than motorways do now. Farms and estates were cut in two, roads closed and new ones made. The road which wound down to the church from the Oxford Road just west of the Roebuck disappeared to be replaced by "New Hill." A large house, probably the manor house then associated with the church and standing roughly where Purley Marina is now, was replaced by Purley Park. Was there no thought of moving the church? Even more surprising, the Oxford Road apparently ran right through the present site of Purley Park house and was diverted in a dog-leg to make room for it. One wonders what the predecessors of our M-way protesters might have said about that!

These changes were shown up by two old parish maps, one dated 1786 and the other 1840, photocopies of which were on sale in Jubilee year at the "Old Purley" exhibition. There must be many other interesting facts tucked away in old records or in the memories of older residents.

If you know something of interest why not write it up for the Purley Parish News?
