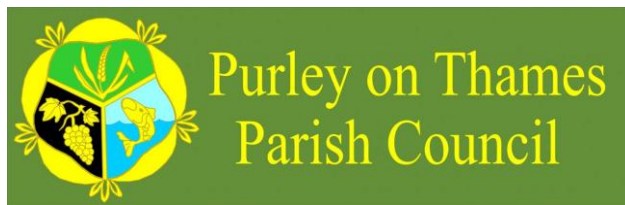
### Fallen tree on footpath

Regular users of the footpath by the Knowsley Road roundabout (the old A329) will be aware that fallen trees and branches had blocked it in the stormy weather we had in January. West Berkshire Council's contractors have now been out and cleared the trees – and the path generally – so it is once again passable.

### Fly posting

Following the item in our December Newsletter, there have been various reports of instances of fly posting around the Purley. As a result, officers have been out and removed notices, adverts and signs from the lower village, Beech Road and A329 Oxford Road.

If you see any fly posters, please do continue to let us know as we have delegated authority from West Berkshire Council to remove them. Do not remove posters yourself as the authority extends only to representatives of the Parish Council.



### **Possible extension to Goosecroft Recreation Ground**

The PC has been offered 2.66 hectares of agricultural land adjoining Goosecroft to extend the recreational area. This is a rare opportunity to expand the playing fields and an application for change of use has been submitted to West Berkshire Council's Planning Department. The main concern raised about the proposal is about parking and we are investigating ways in which any increase in the number of cars could be catered for at Goosecroft.

### **Thames Valley Police**

Further to the item in last month's Newsletter, we have been advised that Acting Sergeant Andy Murray will be our main contact on the West Berkshire Neighbourhood Police Team for the next few months until the new substantive sergeant can join the team.

Andy has been with Thames Valley Police for nearly ten years and, although this is his first Neighbourhood posting, he brings with him a wealth of experience as a response officer in West Berkshire over those years. 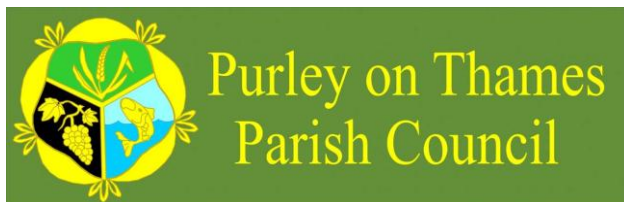
### **West Berkshire Council**

West Berkshire Council's Business Support Service has teamed with Blake Consultants Limited to offer local businesses a free workshop on the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR).

On 25 May 2018, new law around data protection will come into force – this will affect the way all businesses collect, store, and use data. The "lifting the lid on GDPR" workshop aims to provide advice to local businesses about data protection, systems and procedures, IT, and marketing. Aimed primarily at B2C or B2B businesses with a UK client base, the workshop will give an understanding about the three most important elements of GDPR:

- Individuals' rights – people will have more rights when it comes to the information businesses hold about them;
- Accountability – businesses will need to have documents and processes in place to show they are adhering to the new regulation; and
- Risk – businesses could be fined up to 4% of global turnover if they are proven to have breached the rules set out in the GDPR.

The free workshop will be held from 9.00am to 11.30am on Thursday 22 March at WBC's offices in Market Street, Newbury. ## **Cold weather warning**

West Berkshire Council (WBC) has issued a cold weather alert warning of an expected cold spell at the end of February/beginning of March. It recommends wearing suitable clothing and heating homes to at least 18°C (65°F) – this advice is particularly important for sedentary people, anyone of 65 years or over, and for those with pre-existing medical conditions. This temperature should be maintained overnight, and warm clothing, thermal blankets and heating aids should be used as appropriate. Having temperatures slightly above 18°C (65°F) might be beneficial for health.

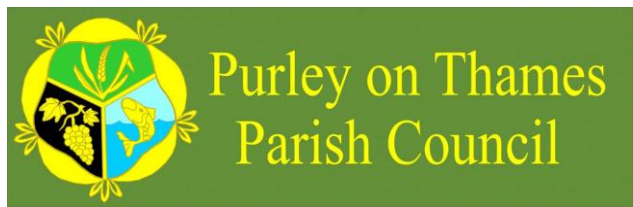
### **Sunflowers**

### **Whitchurch Bridge**

As you might have noticed, the 20mph speed limit in Pangbourne has recently been extended across the length of Whitchurch Bridge. This is because the cost of widening the approach road from Pangbourne to the bridge proved higher than hoped, so the decision was made to proceed immediately with a traffic calming scheme which joins up with the existing 20 mph zone to give a continuous 20mph limit from the toll booth, over the bridge and along Whitchurch Road into Pangbourne.

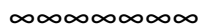

The West Berkshire Museum's special exhibition, "Hoards and Treasure", opened on 24 January 2018 and will run until January 2019. It brings together an extraordinary range of items discovered in 13 West Berkshire parishes. The hoards range in date from the Bronze Age to the late 18<sup>th</sup> century, and contain all sorts of objects. Treasure items found locally, some as recently as last year, are also on display.

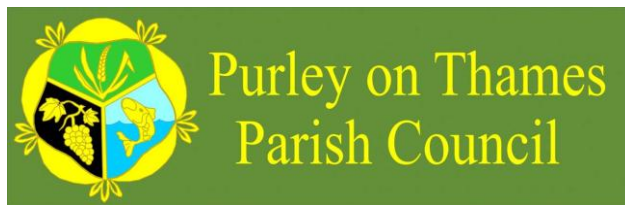
